### From the Board Chairman



2013-2014 was a very historic school year for the Polaris community. The year marked the school's expansion into 8th grade, as well as its first year operating at full capacity. It was also Polaris' first opporunity to host 60 educators from around the country during its Expeditionary Learning Mentor School Site Seminar. For two full days, Polaris was able to provide professional development, sharing teaching principles with students and educators alike.

Most importantly, the year concluded with our congratulatory farewell to our first-ever graduating class. I am proud to share that 100% of Polaris' graduates gained acceptance into high quality high schools that they themselves researched and selected – "Schools of Choice" as we like to refer to them. It's hard to imagine that back in 2nd grade, only 8% of these children were performing at grade level. However, in their final year, 85% of these students were qualified to test for selective enrollment high schools. Watching them cross the stage in June, I was humbled by their accomplishments and could not have been more excited for their futures.

The work that takes place at Polaris is truly magical, and it has stayed true to its tagline: "Where Learning Has No Boundaries." Students have studied in Shanghai, given keynote addresses in front of hundreds of people, written and published blogs, interviewed historians and activists, studied epidemics, and the list goes on and on.

We thank you for your continued interest in the growth and development of our school community, and cherish the opportunities that you have opened up for such amazing children. Thank you again for all of your wonderful support.

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## From the Head of School

The seven-year journey of growing a kindergarten through 8th grade Expeditionary Learning School in the heart of West Humboldt Park has been a long and exciting process. Since opening our doors in 2007, Polaris has focused on our mission of educating self-motivated, creative, critical thinkers. As part of our journey, we always knew the 2013/2014 school year would be a milestone year for Polaris.

Polaris students "made their mark" in a number of significant ways last year. Graduating our inaugural 8th grade class was one momentous event. But students throughout the school were engaged in the creation of high quality work that met rigorous standards, positively impacting our community.

As part of an in-depth investigation into the Civil Rights movement, over 85 fifth and sixth grade students traveled to Birmingham, Alabama, to experience the history they had been studying. They learned from experts at the 16th Street Baptist Church, the Civil Rights Museum and Kelly Ingram Park (site of the historic Children's March of 1963). One of the most powerful and memorable aspects of their work in Birmingham came in the delivery of their final product. Trained by experts and armed with professional recording equipment, Polaris students interviewed Foot Soldiers (participants in the Children's March of 1963) for StoryCorp. Their original digital interviews are now part of the StoryCorp national archive in the Library of Congress, Washington D.C.





## This year, Chicago Public Schools

transitioned from the paper-and-pencil Illinois Standard 0% Achievement Test (ISAT) to the digital testing format of

Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) provided by the Northwest Evalutaion Association (NWEA). As a school within the CPS district, Polaris students participated in this new online test with their peers, scoring at the 50th percentile overall. While some dip in scores was anticipated due to the change in testing format, this year's results illustrated the degree of the digital divide our students face and the areas of improvement for Polaris to focus on moving forward.




## Making their mark in Chicago.

As an Expeditionary Learning school, Polaris structures its science and social studies curriculum around "learning expeditions": long-term investigations that are developed around Next Generation Science Standards and Illinois State Learning Standards. Students conduct fieldwork, learn from experts and work collaboratively to create high-quality end products for audiences beyond the classroom.

In 2013, Polaris 7th graders embarked on an expedition to decrease gun violence in Chicago. The Peacekeeper Project challenged the students to confront every Point of Polaris (Integrity, Critical Thinker, Explorer, Compassion and Active Citizen), resulting in an astoundingly successful Day of Peace. On this day, June 10, no murders nor shootings were reported in their community of West Humboldt Park nor any of the SEVEN surrounding neighborhoods. To accompany this project, students published Peacekeepers of Chicago, a book compiling the biographies of 16 of Chicago's most remarkable Peacekeepers. Today, this book is featured in the Mayor Daley Branch of the

Chicago Public Library and serves as an expression of gratitude from the Polaris 7th graders to their local heroes.

This year, after catching the attention of the **Expeditionary Learning (EL)** network, The Peacekeeper Project was able to continue impacting lives. Less than a year after their successful Day of Peace, four previous project managers, Kameron Boyd, Desiree Gabarin, DeAngelo Pinkston, and Ameerah Rollins - now in their 8th grade year - were asked to represent their crews at the 2014 EL National Conference in Atlanta, Georgia. With the help of their dynamic drama instructor, Georgette Verdin, and the mentorship of EL's Chief Academic Officer, Ron Berger, these four students were coached on sharing their experience with the Peacekeeper Project as the conference's keynote speech.

Highlighting the challenges of organizing their June 10 Day of Peace and elaborating on their struggles to bring it to fruition, the Polaris Peacekeepers delivered a 30 minute oration to a standing ovation of 1,000 educators from across the nation. Since their speech, Kameron, Desiree, DeAngelo and Ameerah have received a second invitation to speak at the **Deeper Learning Conference** in San Diego, California, as well as an invitation to write a blog about Deeper Learning to the digital education community, sponsored by the **Hewlett Foundation**.
