

Reminder....



EL Education presents... The 1st Annual BETTER WORLD DAY

The countdown in on! On Friday, May 4th, join more than 50,000 EL Education students and teachers for Better World Day, a time to honor the power of students across the country to shape a more just future through their learning. School communities will share student work that has contributed to a better world and connect with fellow citizen scholars across the country in acts of service.

In conjunction with EL Education's Better World Day project, Polaris Charter Academy is excited to announce "Our Day to Play" march and rally on May 4th. Our eighth grade students are planning a day to promote "Peace & Unity in our CommUNITY."

Seventh and eighth graders will kick off the event with a beautification of Sawyer Avenue, from Chicago Avenue to Franklin Street. The initiative includes a "Sweep and Greet" to clean up garbage and gifting potted plants to our neighbors.

In the afternoon, following the "Sweep and Greet," all students K-8 will have an opportunity to come together in unity and participate in a Peace March. The Peace March will begin at Polaris. We will march to Franklin, then head west on Franklin to Homan, Homan to Chicago, then Chicago back to Sawyer. Police will escort us as students, staff and community members chant and hold signs promoting peace in our community.

PCA's Better World Day culminates into the "Our Day to Play" Peace Rally at Kells Park, on the corner of Chicago and Sawyer. Kells Park will have music, speakers, food, play and connections to community organizations.

5th & 6th Graders Take On ALABAMA! May 1 – May 4

5th & 6th grade students have embarked on a year long expedition on the topic of the Civil Rights Movement, investigating what it means to be equal by studying the perspectives of others, context of historical evens, and examining of media/artwork.

Students have spent the year analyzing primary and secondary sources throughout history to determine the perspective of others during the experience of school integration of the Little Rock 9, The Great Migration, & The Children's Crusade.

From May 1 - 4, $5^{th} \& 6^{th}$ grade students will head to Birmingham, Alabama on overnight fieldwork to investigate the sites that were pivotal to the Civil Rights Movement. As historians they will walk where many great civil rights leaders have walked to experience first-hand what it was like to be part of the movement. In partnership with the Foot Soldiers (those who participated in the Children's March) students will tour the site of the march (Kelly Ingram Park), the 17th Street Baptist Church and the Civil Rights Institute.

PBS NewsHour will follow our students and do a story featuring their learning.
